Projects include the permanent installation of new solar panels, revitalizing our micro-hydro system, improving & maintaining the newly donated wind turbine, creation of informational & learning materials specific to our off-grid system, research & design a methane digester, craft an off-grid laundry machine, continue beautifying the farmstead through artistic projects, & complete our newly crafted tiny cabins including natural plasters on the insulative light straw clay walls.

We look forward to finishing & sharing these new living spaces with friends like you! They include the octagonal cabin we call The Hive, Crone's Cabin made specifically to host elder relatives & friends, & a delightful Tiny House up on the hill – all integrating passive solar & intentional design aspects.



- Raised turkeys, rabbits, ducks, & guineas from babies; added a new little Billy to our goat yard in hopes of future babies; & added new catfish & bass to our pond

We extend our gratitude to Leon Santen & Whitney Xu for your deep love, passion & respect for Woodland Harvest & for the endless hours spent organizing, coordinating, meeting, creating, troubleshooting, caring for the community, & so much more! It is together we manifest this wonderful new way of learning, loving & growing at Woodland Harvest.

In July, with literally weeks to decide upon & prepare for this new adventure... we knew our dreams were being manifested, but still didn't know what to expect... WOW were we in for a festive transformative wild ride into the future as hosts to 15 eager young college students for an entire semester! Cheers to radical creativity in the face of global crisis.

This fall we've evolved our teaching & learning space at the base of Bluff Mountain in a variety of ways:

- creation of three new handcrafted tiny cabins using natural building techniques like on-site harvested locust posts, Ashe County milled lumber, light straw clay insulation, and locally sourced cob (a mix of clay & sand) & recycled bottle walls
- enhancement of our off-grid electrical system with the addition of five new solar panels, a new battery bank, new gadgets to streamline & analyze the system, & a donated wind turbine installed at the horse barn for additional refrigeration & another plug-in for folks around the farm
- variety of improvements around the land like repairing damaged roofing, old windows & gate latches, better organizing & using scavenged resources, & improving the main house flow for hosting groups of folks
- more living & learning spaces in the making as we begin renovations on the old school bus, work to complete the forest treehouse, & begin an art studio within the resource area
- learned so much about what it takes to live in community including love & dedication to the whole!
- we cannot begin to express our gratitude to Anya, Blake, Carlos, Drew, Dylan, Jasmine, Jeremy, Leon, Katie, Mia, Nicola, Odalys, Riley, Seba, & Whitney for the immeasurable contributions they've made to our lives & this sacred land. Blessed be the Mystery!
